Graduates will be able to constructively challenge current practices, communicate information to athletes and clients that they encounter and explore new concepts, in order to safeguard the horse. Graduates will appreciate the complexities involved in facilitating human behaviour change and communicate challenging topics to a range of audiences effectively.

BSc Equestrian Sports Coaching with integrated placement year graduates will have developed a personal coaching philosophy grounded in reflection upon both practice and 'self', contextual to the needs of the equestrian athlete. They will be optimally placed to positively influence the equine industry as equestrian sports coaches, with a solid underpinning in coaching theory which they can practically apply to a range of coaching scenarios. Graduates will have an applied understanding of equitation science, enabling them to educate horse riders in the use of ethical training methods and principles. Graduates will be able to constructively challenge current practices, communicate information to athletes and clients that they encounter and explore new concepts, in order to safeguard the horse. They will have spent a year working within the industry to develop their application of these skills.

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Journey:

Teaching and learning will occur through a mix of scheduled and independent learning. Students learn through a variety of approaches, therefore a range of methods are used within taught delivery. These include, but are not limited to; lectures, practical coaching sessions within a variety of groups/populations, debates, laboratory (practical and computer based) sessions, work-related learning and seminar/discussion sessions centered around current published literature.

A wide range of assessment types are utilised within the modules offering students the opportunity to excel through written examinations and assignments, oral assessments related to case study scenarios enabling students to practice developing their skills in varied communication methods to a range of audiences. Students will be assessed within a variety of coaching practical domains e.g. peer coaching and coaching flatwork, jumping, groups and individuals to suit industry requirements.

A key feature of the BSc (Hons) Equestrian Sports Coaching is the assessed portfolios, completed during each year of study. Portfolios offer the opportunity for students to align undergraduate study to existing professional work programmes, which maximise the authenticity of their independent learning. Coaching learning portfolios involve coaches in individual and group reflection, the critically challenging act of thinking about coaching practice, and constructing (and communicating) a sense of the learning experience as a coherent developmental process. Such thinking and sharing are the linchpins of lifelong, active learning and every practitioner's professional development. Through investment in and accumulation of a coaching portfolio students will start to develop their ability to critically reflect and practice with purpose, thus continually becoming a more appropriately qualified practitioner.
